Topic: Becoming Like Children Bible Passage: Matthew 18:1–5

Study Guide Overview

Main Theme: Jesus redefines greatness through the posture of childlike faith—simple, dependent, and humble —and calls us to value children not as future believers, but as vital ministers in His kingdom today.

1. Childlike Faith, Not Childish Faith

When Jesus called a child into the center of the crowd and said, "*Unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven*" (Matt 18:3), He wasn't calling us to be immature—but to rediscover *simplicity, trust, and awe.*

Childlike faith is **uncomplicated**. It takes God at His Word even when not everything is understood.

"God created. We are broken. Jesus saves."

It is a faith that says, "I don't understand it all—but I trust the One who does."

By contrast, **childish faith** is complicated and self-centered.

Childishness clings to ego, demands control, and doubts God when life doesn't make sense. It tries to *explain away* the miraculous and *rationalize* mystery.

To be childish is to stop learning; to be childlike is to keep *wondering*.

2. Growing Into Dependence Is Spiritual Maturity

"Faith doesn't grow out of dependence; it grows into it."

In life, we mature *out of* dependence—but in faith, we mature *into* it.

The mark of spiritual growth is not greater independence from God but deeper reliance upon Him.

Children instinctively know their need. The only way to receive God is to **recognize our need for Him**.

The gospel is offensive because it exposes our true condition—we cannot save ourselves.

"Good people don't go to heaven; forgiven people do."

Christian maturity is not self-sufficiency—it's self-surrender.

It's living daily from a place of *trust, humility, and awe*—not cynicism or control.

3. Valuing Children and Empowering Their Ministry

Jesus didn't only call adults to be childlike; He **redefined the value of children** themselves.

In the ancient world, children had no status or legal protection. But Jesus publicly honoured them, placing a child at the center and declaring, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me."

It was a revolutionary statement—one that reshaped human ethics.

At VPBC, we reflect this same truth: children are not the church of tomorrow—they are ministers of today.

Their prayers matter. Their voices carry heaven's power.

We don't just *teach* them; we *learn from* them.

We don't just *pray* for them; we *pray with* them—and invite them to pray for us.

Our calling is to **help children discover their spiritual gifts**, nurture their faith, and empower their purpose in the body of Christ.

Small Group Questions/Discussions

Theme: Childlike, Not Childish - Becoming Dependent on God Again

Icebreaker

- Share a funny "childlike moment" in your own life—maybe when your kids (or you!) said something surprisingly simple yet profound about faith.
- What's one thing about being a kid you wish you could get back?

Scripture

Read Matthew 18:1-6 together.

Optional: Also read Mark 10:13–16 and 1 Corinthians 1:18.

Discussion Questions

1. Childlike vs. Childish Faith

- How would you describe the difference between *childlike* and *childish* faith in your own words?
- Why do you think Jesus made "becoming like a child" a condition for entering His Kingdom?
- In what ways can our sophistication or cynicism actually distance us from God?

Reflect: Where have you overcomplicated your faith? What would it look like to simplify it again?

2. Growing into Dependence

- "Faith doesn't grow out of dependence; it grows into it." What does that mean to you personally?
- When was a time you felt totally dependent on God—and how did that deepen your faith?
- How can we model *dependence on Christ* to those around us without it appearing like weakness?

Challenge: Ask God to show you one area of your life where you're trying to be self-sufficient—and surrender it to Him this week.

Small Group Questions/Discussions

3. Valuing and Empowering Children

- What does it mean to "welcome a child in Jesus' name" in our church context today?
- Why do you think Jesus was so passionate about protecting and affirming children?
- What could it look like for us, as adults, to help kids in our church discover their **spiritual gifts** and use them?

Practical Idea: This week, intentionally pray with a child—or ask one to pray for you. You might be surprised what God says through them.

Reflection & Prayer

Close by reading Mark 10:16 together:

"And taking them in His arms, He blessed them."

Pray that:

- We would have *uncomplicated*, *childlike trust* in God.
- We would grow in *dependence* rather than self-reliance.
- We would *value*, *equip*, *and learn from* the children God has placed among us.

Encourage your group to bless a child this week—with words, prayer, or time.
